Working and Learning Within a Group

Being embarrassed is not bad though because this uncomfortable feeling can be transformed into the best motivation in order to change something.

But if mistakes are made on purpose, because of selfish intents, then there is always a slightly nagging burden in the background of becoming exposed. This is not only burdening though, but also a waste of energy, for being permanently occupied to hide one's intent, keeps one rather busy. Nevertheless, sooner or later the selfish behavior will be exposed, which is not only embarrassing, but might forever destroy the confidence once given to the person concerned.

Being honest, doing as best as one knows and making mistakes anyway, only means to evolve. It's a big error to assume one can prevent making mistakes. Those people, who always try to hide their mistakes because they want to be better than their fellowman, have not yet understood the sense of life. Fact is no human being is better than another one, because everybody is making mistakes; therefore, no one has to be embarrassed about the mistake itself, only about the refusal to learn from it.

People who always agree with everything because they are glad that someone is doing the work, or those who can never agree because they think to know better, have not yet enough interest in really being a part of a group.
